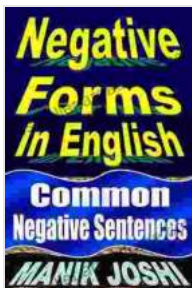


Negative Forms in English: A Comprehensive Guide

For example:

- I **not** like coffee.
- He **not** go to school today.
- They **not** have any money.

"Not" can also be used to negate adjectives and adverbs.

For example:

- The coffee is **not** good.
- He is **not** very tall.
- They are **not** here now.

Negative Questions

To form a negative question, simply add "not" to the beginning of the question.

For example:

- **Not** do you like coffee?
- **Not** is he going to school today?
- **Not** do they have any money?

Negative Imperatives

To form a negative imperative, use the word "don't" (short for "do not"). "Don't" is placed before the verb.

For example:
